Both sharing the same parenting values and beliefs, such as the importance of proper nutrition, they began researching the best food options for their babies. Sandy began making her own purees from scratch and wondered how many parents don't have the time or patience to make their own purees and resort to store-bought purees. After discussing her new business idea with Jessica, <u>Itty-Bitty Spoons</u> gradually came to life. Although they both dabbled in a few other small business ventures, this one became their mutual love. It was important to both of them to alleviate parent's stress by offering healthy, affordable and nutritious food options. The products from their home-based business are prepared in a safe and clean environment, using Bpa certified equipment and approved by East Ontario Health Unit. Their

products contain no preservatives, no additives, no added sugar, no added salt and are 100% vegan. They also have their food handler certification.

Itty-Bitty Spoons is the only business offering these products in Canada. Unique and innovative!

Sandy and Jessica have had bumps in the road, mainly financing this project during a time of inflation and economical uncertainty but with their community and local businesses support, they are so grateful they never gave up. They have learned to stop the added pressure of setting deadlines for the growth of their business. "Setting goals is amazing but the added pressure from the deadlines is unnecessary".

Being your own boss is almost everyone's dream. Everyone has their own secret to success and everyone's definition of success is different. Success to Sandy and Jessica means helping as many people as they







can who enjoy being healthy and having proper nutrition at an affordable price and serving and helping their community. They reach out to their customers with compassion and empathy, letting them know their moms too.

Itty-Bitty Spoons has exciting future plans. They will have a few establishments around the area with smoothie bars, healthy food options, dine in and/or take out, a play area for kids with an early child educator and definitely options to buy their products.

"Our advice to women entrepreneurs is most definitely give that business idea a chance. It will be hard but keep that beautiful head up and focus on the positive outcome and from

there, anything is possible."

In closing, Sandy and Jessica strongly believe society is to blame for the so-called challenge differences between men and women. Starting a business is challenging regardless of gender. The real difference lies within how the challenges will be dealt with as women and men are "wired" completely different. For a long time, men were usually the ones in power. Over time, women finally began standing up and putting their foot down when realizing we also have that capacity and power within us. The more women stand together and build each other up, the more women may find that strength to launch their entrepreneurial journey.

In this edition, we would like to introduce you a successful entrepreneur based in Toronto, Manon Tournayre. She is a brilliant business woman who started a new adventure in March 2019 with her husband and business partner Charles Boggio. Their new wine bar called the Conci is located in the heart of Toronto and despite the fact that the pandemic has put their

business at risk, she worked hard and found a way to innovate to make her business thrive!

Manon Tournayre is originally from France where she studied international and foreign business. She then moved to Canada to start an internship where her father and brother WHO had a business called Jules Café Patisserie. She finally decided to stay in Canada to support her father who was diagnosed with cancer and joined the family business with her brother. With hard work and her father guidance, she learned how to be an entrepreneur.

"You need to tell yourself that you are strong and worth it. That you can move mountains and that no one will stop you. "

She met her husband Charles, who is a chef, when she tried to hire him for a new restaurant project that had eventually failed during the creation process. She has passion for wines and him for food so they decided to combine their passions to make the perfect recipe to start a new venture: open a new concept with bakery the day and wine bar restaurant at night. The name original name was Le Conciliabule.

Unfortunately, Covid has hit in 2020 and they had to innovate to keep the business running. Manon came up with a strategy to use social medias to promote her online orders in the neighborhood, and they have expanded their terrace along with the wine list up to 100 wines with a new pastry menu to meet the customer demands in a pandemic context.

Since she opened Le Conciliabule, she has faced many challenges but yet it was all for the good reasons. She found a certain balance, flow, harmony and really found herself in her professions.


"We do what we do because food and wine bring people together, build memories, moments. laughs. "

After this success and thriven by passion, she decided to start a new joint venture with her brother called Le Conciliabule Lab in August 2022 in Cabbage Town and changed the name of her wine bar to Conci.

Manon's recipe to success: "I believe the key words of my success are: discipline, modesty, determination, fairness and diplomacy. Learning from your mistakes is extremely important. Being stubborn is good but modesty is better. Listening to people around you, observing other entrepreneurs operate and learn from your elders. AND most of all discipline is the most important key word. Never postpone to tomorrow what needs to be done today. "



The Prescott-Russell Community Development Corporation (PRCDC), sponsored by FedDev Ontario, continues to deliver its mandate to encourage the development and diversification of local economy. We offer various services for all your entrepreneurial projects.



Investment Fund Ioan

The Investment Fund loan provides a funding source, up to a maximum of \$250 000, to new and existing businesses in the Prescott and Russell region. This source of financing is structured with flexible repayment terms and an assessment of your project and assistance in obtaining realistic funding.

Young Entrepreneur Ioan

The Young Entrepreneur loan has been created to reduce the out-migration of young people towards urban centers and aims at supporting young entrepreneurs from 18 to 35 years of age in the Prescott-Russell region with available funding from \$5 000 to \$30 000.

Express loan

The **Express** loan is created to support the operational continuity of businesses in the Prescott Russell région. Funding up to a maximum of \$15 000 for expenses such as leasehold improvements, increase inventory, help with working capital, improve equipment and marketing, to name a few.

EDISO loan In partnership with the **Fondation franco-ontarienne**, the **EDISO** program offers funding up 04 to a maximum of \$30 000 and is designed to strengthen the foundation, sustainability and competitiveness of francophone communities in southern Ontario




